At Least We Are Talking

Well It's been a few years now since someone said "how about you George" in regards to being nominated at an AGM. I remember how terrified I was that I would mess everything up and everyone would be really mad at me!

So I sat down and read the constitution and talked to people and started putting some mental notes together and came up with lists of stuff that had to be done.

The problem with to do lists is that invariably a lot of things don't get checked off. This is often because new tasks come along that you didn't expect. -We showcase highland dancing very well. MHDA provides many opportunities to show case highland dance to the public through dance outs, The Tartan Tea and at folklorama.

-Taking the Manitoba Highland Dancers' Association outside the Perimeter Highway was a very big goal that we had over the past three years. There of course was highland dancing outside Winnipeg but if our organization wants to grow we need to be involved in promoting ourselves to dancers and the general public in other cities and rural Manitoba. Hosting a competition in Brandon was one step in this and it needs ongoing resolve to make sure that it continues.

-On the financial side of things we are healthy because we have had reserves of money to help us. We have made real strides in exercising more control over our funds and better use of them. It is not easy to figure out where to cut and where to spend but I believe that we are going in the right direction of living within our means. We are also gaining some ground in the fundraising area and I hope that new revenue can be generated in the future so we have money to better meet our goals.

As I said in the title: "At least we are talking". By that I mean that we are conscious of the goals that need to be focused on. The one area that I hope that the next executive and all of you will keep in mind going forward is growth. We need more dancers. Not just for MHDA but for highland dancing in general. If you can do anything to help get more people interested in highland dance then Do It! Bring a friend to dance class. Give someone a dance teacher's phone number. Take your teachers and start a school. Do whatever you can do. It is involvement in highland that will keep this link to Scottish culture going and thriving.

I am very grateful for all the support I have had over the past few years as president. It is impossible to thank everyone by name. True friends tell you when you are right but also when they think you are wrong but they are always there to help you back up after a stumble.

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I remain president until the end of our year with the current executive. After that time I take on the role of Past President and Chairperson for the meetings.
