5th Annual SDCCS Travel Fundraiser a Big Success!

On June 1, the MHDA once again hosted a fundraiser to assist dancers travelling to SDCCS. We stayed with the CanadInns chain, but used Cowboys Nite Club at the Windsor Park location. This year was a terrific success. We had more participants, guests, money raised and dancers performing than ever before! We are proud to have had some level of participation from 27 dancers, ranging from Primaries to adult Premiers. There were 24 dancers filling the stage and floor to perform for over 200 guests. Our silent auction, with an impressive 29 baskets, generated almost double last year's sales and the 50/50 pot was over \$350! Irene Baird featured in Riverview Health Centre's 'Health Views' newsletter

She'd begun highland dancing at the age of five, growing up in Edinburgh. When she came to Winnipeg as a young bride in 1963, it wasn't too long before she was asked to teach highland dance. The rest, as they say, is history. Her school flourished. Over the years, she taught hundreds of young people and travelled with them to competitions around the world. She and her students won countless prestigious awards. But in

her late seventies, Irene's legs were beginning to let her down and her quality of life was diminishing. In the fall of 2016, she moved to the Personal Care unit at Riverview Health Centre. She thought her life was over. Continuing to Teach It wasn't. In fact, she says, it was the opposite. That's because, when asked, staff didn't hesitate to provide a suitable space in the Centre for Irene to continue to teach dance. Now, the 80-year-old finds joy in spending an hour every Sunday morning coaching a small group of highland dancers. "The staff have given me a reason to live," she says. "It's exciting for me to be thinking about dance again." Irene is grateful to Riverview for making this happen, but she's also appreciative of the Centre's overall care. Since arriving, her health - and her outlook - have improved. She says that, busy as they are, staff are always obliging and look after her well. That can even include getting her nails painted (a bright red with silver sparkles!) by the recreation staff. Doing Her Part She plays a role in making sure quality care is provided to everyone - she is president of the residents' association and she makes it a habit to visit other residents who, she says, "are going through a rough time." When it's time to rest, Irene says she enjoys the privacy of her room and especially appreciates the nature scene right outside her window. "I've always liked to be out in nature and this is such a lovely setting, so close to the river," she says, adding the bright, airy building with lots of windows is a pleasant place to be. And you can bet that on days when the accordion player comes to entertain, Irene is in the place she really likes to be: the front row, encouraging him to play Scottish dance music!
